Dear Friends

On our holiday in Yorkshire recently, Steph and I visited Richmond Castle. Built to strengthen defences against the Northern invaders, it was a place that encountered many battles, both physical and political.

The Castle today lies in ruins for the most part, although much of the outer walls remain impressively intact. St Nicholas Chapel can be found within the walls, a rare example of a small interior chapel, in which only a few people could gather. The Chapel was a small haven of prayer and contemplation, and one could imagine, during tumultuous and chaotic times, prayers rising to heaven for peace, sanctuary and protection. It was also a place for contemplation and retreat.

Perhaps our world can seem chaotic at times too. Our world in many places is beset by conflict and division. For some it's the turmoil of our jobs: constant pressures or frustrating bosses. For others it's the turmoil in our families: tensions at home, concern for the children or the grandchildren. For others it's the turmoil of our health: recovering from an operation, the depression, the anxiety, the frustrations of old-age. For others it's the turmoil of our finances: paying the bills, pension worries.

Young people all over the country have completed their exams, I guess many will be hoping they can now find some time to relax after all their hard work. I was involved recently in a very moving leavers' service at one of our Primary schools. The children had written profound words about their ups and downs at school, as well as their hopes and fears for the future. Some mentioned looking forward to the summer break.

Recently, General Synod voted in favour of clergy taking 36 hours off a week rather than 24. Clergy are often not very good at taking time off, and I know of colleagues that work on regardless of their real need for a break. But we all need holidays or times on retreat.



For our children at our two church schools, they have their summer holidays that could well bring trepidation to parents, carers, and grandparents: Will there be a play scheme to look after the kids whilst I have to work? How will we cope with 6 weeks out of routine? As mentioned, for our Year 6 children, this is a big holiday after a big ending, as we say 'goodbye' and 'good luck' to them, as their educational adventure continues into a new school.

Holidays in particular are about much more than recreation. They serve an important role in our re-creation. Steph and I spent much time in the Yorkshire Dales National Park on our break. Recreation was at the heart of the foundation of the first National Parks; the realisation that people need spaces which allow them to be re-created, remade. These spaces help repair the 'wear and tear' of daily living; recognising that just as our bodies are continually replacing worn and damaged cells, so we need to repair our tired minds, emotions, and souls.

At Aysgarth Falls – the lower falls – in the bright heat and warmth of the afternoon, we spent some time being still and reflecting, as the torrential water raged past us, as it descended the rocky steps to the calm deep river below. It was a wonderful time of peace, of hope, of restoration. We both felt a powerful sense of God's presence, as we marvelled at His creation. The sunlight and flowing river reminded us of the renewal that creation brings through the Holy Spirit. Psalm 46.10 **'Be still and know that I am God'** was palpable.

We see renewal and restoration in a God who was not only at the heart of creation as a one-off event, but who goes on creating and re-creating;

'Behold, I make all things new' (Revelation 21:5).

Maybe that's because God did not view us as some battery-powered machine to be set loose and allowed to run about until our batteries ran out, but as a more fragile vessel to be nurtured and re-formed as we live and grow.

This summer, regardless of whether or not you have had a holiday already, throw off that 'Protestant Work



Ethic' (it's neither Protestant nor Christian anyway) and enjoy a bit of recreation with your recreation in the presence of your creator. Ensure you find some time to enjoy your Holy Days - that's where the word holiday comes from!

The favoured way was using the iNaturalist App, with which we could both get help with identifying what we saw, and submit the results to the national data base at the same time. There was also the option of filling in a paper form which could be emailed in afterwards. We did a mixture of the two with most of the adults using the app and the group with the children using the paper form.



We split into 3 pairs, and one family group, and divided St John's churchyard into parts, tackling one part each.



I was very pleased that Pam, who knows a lot about what is growing in our churchyard, came along and pointed out some of the more unusual plants.

All the data submitted from churchvard every has to be checked to give a picture of how nature is faring in the UK. This is still in progress. Some of the things we submitted from our churchyard are pictured here.

The Canon Clement Mysteries: Some Thoughts

Having just finished *Murder at the Monastery*, the third of Richard Coles' Canon Clement series, I wanted to share my impressions.

Firstly, the strength of this series is not the mysteries themselves. They're workmanlike and seem to gain less importance as the series progresses, as the author increasingly explores Daniel Clement's emotions and relationships.

The real joy, for me, is in Coles's prose (at times glorious) and his clever depiction of English parish life. The rivalries, the petty jealousies, high church versus low: he captures them all and often had me grinning knowingly.

Those of us who've read Coles's autobiography will recognise plenty of the author in his creation, too - such as the pet dogs and the family background in shoe making.

There is spirituality aplenty in the text,

but if you're thinking of trying the series, don't expect another Cadfael. While there's no sex 'on page' there are references to it, as there are to drug taking, and the text is sprinkled with plenty of four letter words. If you're easily offended, these may not be the books for you.





The Good Shepherd

Psalm 23 is well loved, and its paraphrased words are often sung in the popular hymn The Lord's My Shepherd. At the time of Jesus, these labourers were everywhere, as sheep were a common commodity. So when Jesus described a shepherd, He was referring to someone the people all knew about.

Our Lord's description of a shepherd helped His hearers to understand Jesus, as they were aware that sheep were valuable. A good shepherd made sure sheep were protected and fed. If they got into danger, they had to be rescued. A hireling would not be so considerate. He would abandon the sheep when faced with dangerous animals or aggressive thieves! Only a good shepherd would risk his life in caring for the flock. In His parable (John 10:1-18) Jesus goes a step further talking about a good shepherd as He is speaking about Himself.

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Sheep know and follow their owner, and Jesus wants us to know and follow Him.

Sheep can get lost and in trouble. Jesus came to our rescue and is our Saviour.

A shepherd knows each sheep by name and Jesus knows us individually too. We can trust Him with our lives.

Jesus said that just as a shepherd is willing to die caring for his sheep, He too would die – looking ahead to His crucifixion. This would secure our salvation and provide a Home with Him.

Jesus also said that there are other sheep of interest to Him! He speaks of being the shepherd of all nations, not just the Jews. His love extends to everyone.

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These words of Jesus are so important. Give thanks that Jesus died for us and now waits for us to be with Him. We belong to Him, we are His people, we are His flock. Lester Amann



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The Transfiguration

In August the church calendar commemorates the Transfiguration. The story is told in Matthew (17:1-9), Mark (9:1-9) and Luke (9:28-36). Jesus took Peter, James and John, His closest disciples, up a high mountain. It may have been Mount Tabor, or else one of the three spurs of Mount Hermon.

Suddenly, Jesus is transfigured. His face shone, his garments became white and dazzling. Elijah and Moses appeared, and a bright cloud overshadowed the disciples. A voice spoke out of the cloud, saying that Jesus was His beloved son, whom the disciple should 'hear'.

Then, just as suddenly, it is all over. What did it mean? Moses represented the Law, and Elijah the Prophets of the Old Covenant. But now the Law and the Prophets have found their fulfilment in Jesus, the Messiah. The written Word and the spoken Word have handed over to the Living Word.



This verse puzzled some women in a Bible study. They wondered what this statement meant about the character and nature of God. One of the women offered to find out.

She rang a silversmith and arranged to watch him at work. She didn't mention anything about



The woman thought about God holding us in such a hot spot, and then she thought again about the verse that says: 'He sits as a refiner and purifier of silver.' She asked the silversmith if it was true that he had to sit there in front of the fire the whole time the silver was being refined.

The man answered that yes, he not only had to sit there holding the silver, but he had to keep his eyes on the silver the entire time it was in the fire. The Discovery of Oxygen

It was 250 years ago, on 1st August 1774, that oxygen was discovered by British chemist Joseph Priestley. He was the first scientist to publish his findings on the discovery.

Born in Yorkshire, Priestley was the eldest son of a strongly Calvinist textile maker, but after his mother's early death he spent much of his time living with his aunt Sarah, where he came into contact with Presbyterian clergy, whose doctrines he preferred. He eventually became strongly Unitarian, denying the Trinity.

His theology created difficulties for him: he was barred from the top universities and after being offered the position of science adviser on explorer Captain James Cook's second voyage, he was 'cancelled' after pressure from Anglicans. However, he was made a Fellow of the Royal Society in 1766, and in 1773 the Earl of Shelburne gave him employment at his estate, Bowood House in Wiltshire. This gave him time for research and access to people of influence.



Until late in the 18th century, air had been regarded as a single entity, rather than a combination of gases. Priestley discovered what he called 'dephlogisticated air' – which he found supported combustion.

Swedish apothecary Carl Wilhelm Scheele made a similar discovery, published later, but called it 'fire air'. It was eventually identified as a separate gas, and Antoine Lavoisier coined the word 'oxygen' from the Greek word for acid-maker. Priestley's tests revealed that oxygen made a flame burn intensely – and kept a mouse alive about four times as long as a similar quantity of ordinary air.

Priestley's beliefs and his support for French revolutionists provoked some to violence, and he and his family were forced to flee to America, where he befriended Benjamin Franklin and Thomas Jefferson, and eventually built a famous house and laboratory in a small town in Pennsylvania. *Tim Lenton*

When Tourists Get Lost

Have you ever got into trouble while abroad? The story is told of a group of tourists who went to a Mediterranean country and wanted to see the sites of an old city. Four members of the group got so engrossed in taking pictures of each other by a castle that they ignored the summons from the tour group leader to go back to the bus. A little while later, they realised they were all on their own in a strange foreign city. That's when their problems started.

The four tourists decided to head back to their hotel. But they couldn't remember the name of the hotel. So they hailed a taxi, and asked it to drive around looking for the hotel. An hour or so later, the driver gave up and demanded payment. That's when they discovered they did not have enough money to pay the driver. He took them to the police, who demanded identification. That's when the tourists remembered they had left their passports in the hotel safe...

Some hours later, the tour guide tracked down the missing tourists. They greeted her with tears of relief as she provided the police with their passports, paid their debt, and prepared to lead them safely back to their hotel. The police warned the tourists: 'From now on, you stay close to your friend!'

Stay close to your friend. It's good advice for all of us. If your life is going in the wrong direction, if you have run up debts of wrong-doing, if you feel lost and alone, you need to take action. You need to stop going on like this. Turn around, and go in another direction. The Bible calls this action of 'stopping and turning around' repentance.

Repentance is when you stop, and you turn to God. For the good news is that there is a heavenly tour guide on whom we can all call. Only God can save us from the mess we are in. He sent us His Son to forgive us our sins, to provide us with an identity and, if we walk with Him, to lead us safely through life. As the Bible says: 'The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.' (Romans 6:23) **Parish Pump**




