



Dear Friends

Happy New Year! As a lot of people do at this time of the year, I think a lot about New Year's resolutions and new beginnings, reflecting on how I hope to improve from the last year.

2024 was a really positive year for the youth work in the Twinspires Churches, with so many exciting things happening. When I look back over the last year, one of the proudest accomplishments I have, is that in our Churches, we now have a group available for every child aged 0 - 18 years throughout the week. One big focal point for my youth work has always been on the relationships we form with the children and families, both inside and outside the Church, rather than the numbers of young people and families.

Despite that, this year - even for the new groups that we have set up - we have seen great numbers coming to all our groups. It was great to start two new groups in 2024, with our Beacon group on a Wednesday evening for those aged 11+ and our Ignite group on a Friday for those aged 4-7. Both of those groups are now flourishing and the young people love coming along.



The heart behind the Beacon group was to create a strong discipleship midweek group available to our Ichthian group (which runs on a Sunday morning) where they could bond and delve deeper into the Bible.

Where MORE has now become more of a drop-in group on a Monday night for a tight-knit group of sixth formers, Beacon is aimed slightly younger, but is much more discipleship focussed.

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The beauty of the Beacon group is that it is mainly led by the young people, which includes them telling me what topics they wish to look and areas that they wouldn't usually look at. We started by looking at the book of Judges before going into real depth about Christmas towards the end of the year. This term we will be starting the new Youth Alpha course which is an exciting way to start the year and look at what faith is, so please do pray for our young people during this time.

Meanwhile our other new group Ignite is a younger form of Net

Net has really grown in the last year where we now get on average around 16 young people, the majority of whom are non-churched from the area and so it is a great form of outreach. We recognised after our Holiday club this year that the 4 - 7s age range was our biggest group and so wanted to do more than just have a group for them

once a year, but a regular weekly group that they could attend. This group has been a great success with about 7 young people a week and has also been a great opportunity for some of our older children to become young leaders, giving them additional opportunities. Every week the young people come, play games, make crafts and do an interactive Bible study on a variety of topics before buying and enjoying their tuck.

These groups, alongside everything else we do for our young people, means that our Youth, Children's and Families work is at a really promising point and I can't wait to see how God is going to work in it throughout the year. We are also hoping to put on more big events throughout the year such as our Good Friday Celebration, Light Party, as well as many others - there are plenty of ways to get involved in our vision that the Church can be at the heart of the community.

However, while there are so many positives, none of this would be possible without our amazing volunteers who work with our young people and support them. I always find one of the huge blessings of youth work is getting the opportunity to come alongside the young people and learn more about them, building that relationship with them and really feeling like you are making a difference in their lives. Youth work isn't just about running around with the young people or playing the games, but is also about praying for them and building those relationships with them as well. It is about shining that light of Jesus so that they are able to grow in their relationship with Him. If that sounds like something that you would like to be involved with, please do let me know. We are always looking for more people to get involved, even if it's just coming along to one of the groups to get a feel for what happens!

I am very excited for what God is going to do this year and can't wait to get underway! Your prayers are appreciated, and as a Youth team, we look forward to 2025!

Angels-Then and Now

When the flower ladies at St Boniface Church told me some weeks before Christmas that, '**Angels from the Realms of Glory**', was to be their theme for the Church decorations, I thought what better topic for a talk on Christmas Morning, as Angels featured so powerfully in the story of Christ's birth.





So how many of us believe in Angels? If we believe the Christmas Story then we must do. For without them, the story is just a story, and not a record of how God sent his messengers to tell His chosen people that, because he loved us so much, he was sending His only Son to live among us as part of His plan for the world.

Have you ever considered what sort of beings Angels are? One description says Angels are spiritual or heavenly supernatural beings that act as messengers or intermediates between God and humanity. Psalm 8 tells us that,' Angels were created by God and that we are also created by God but a little lower than the Angels...'

So, if God created the Angels, what was their job description, their role? One scholar summed up their purpose under 5 headings

- 1. **To Make Announcements** to be God's Messengers to tell people about God's purpose. We heard several of these in the Christmas readings from Matthew and Luke, when Angels visited Zechariah, Mary, Joseph and the shepherds
- 2. **Protection** of God's chosen people such as when Daniel was cast into the lion's den and remained unharmed because God had sent an Angel to shut the mouths of the lions. (Daniel 6:22)
- 3. **To Worship God** and sing his praises in heaven and on earth as reported in Revelations 4 and 5 and in Luke, when Angels appeared as a heavenly host to the shepherds (Luke 2:8-15).
- 4. **Provision** -To care for the needs of God's people, as an Angel warned Joseph to take Mary and the Holy child to a place of safety and not return to Nazareth (Matthew 2:13-14) Also when the angels ministered to Jesus after Satan tried to tempt Him in the wilderness Matthew (4:11)
- 5. **To Carry out God's Plan** for the world and for His people. (We are God's people- he has a plan for each one of us)

There are more than 550 hymns and carols about Angels and they are mentioned 293 times in the Bible. I wonder how many people today believe in Angels? Did you know that Abba even had a hit song about them some years ago which is still popular today.

Angels are usually depicted as beautiful humanlike beings, wearing white robes and with large feathered wings; but when they came to Abraham to tell him that his aged wife would bear a son; they were dressed as ordinary travellers. Do we believe God's Angels are at work in the world today and would we recognise one if we met or heard one?

Have you ever heard a voice when you are driving on your own which has told you to take a different route home only to find there was a bad accident on the road you usually took? Have you ever received help from a complete stranger? Is this the work of Angels ?

I wonder does God need us sometimes to do the work of Angels? Can we think of times when God has sent us to give a message to someone? Perhaps to care for someone who is grieving or protect them from forces which are taking then away from God's plan for them by encouraging someone to return to Sunday worship?

Perhaps to be an earthly 'Angel', all we need to do is remember the job description I mentioned earlier and share the love that our Heavenly Father has for each one of us to bring others out of darkness and into the light of Christ which is God's plan for all people.

A friend of mine believes that when she finds a white feather it's a sign that an Angel has passed by. I am not sure I believe that – but something very strange happened to me as I got out of my car returning home after the Christmas Service at St Boniface Church.There was a small white feather on the ground where I put my feet!

Star of Bethlehem

Some of you may have seen the BBC programme 'Under the Christmas Sky' with Chris Packham and Michaela Strachan. (This is still available on BBC iPlayer: <u>https://www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/b0bwb7p1</u>)

They were in the Jordanian Desert, with their guide, on three camels, looking at a triple conjunction of Jupiter, Saturn and Mars - an earlier occurrence of which started the wise men on their journey. Their guide and astronomer said that the triple conjunction in 7BC was very unusual to see in one year - this only comes every 800 years. There is also a tablet from Babylon, which has Jupiter and Saturn in conjunction 3 times in 7BC.

They were very excited that they had seen the Star of Bethlehem, but this was not the Star of Bethlehem. It was a sign for astrologers that these three planets were seen in the constellation of Pisces (the Fish) which was related to Israel and the King in Jerusalem, helping to guide them there. The later Star of Bethlehem was a very bright comet in 5BC, noted by Chinese astronomers, who kept very accurate astronomical records.

The wise men would have been astonished with the first triple conjunction; and with the second one, they started to make plans for their journey. At

the third conjunction could be when they started their journey, which could take quite a long time from Persia. So they arrived in Bethlehem in 5BC, with the



comet leading them to where Jesus was in the house (Matthew 2.11).

We can also think of Joseph and Mary, starting their journey to Bethlehem, with the second conjunction The birth of Jesus would have been in September, at the third conjunction. Quirinius was the military governor of Syria in 7BC, when the first census took place. (Luke 2:1-2 – Tom Wright)

In the programme, their guide referred to Jupiter, the king of the planets – a vast gas giant, large enough to hold all of the planets together. I like to think of Jupiter representing God the Father, controlling everything. Saturn is like the Spirit – a very peaceful planet with rings, rather like wings. Mars (the Roman god of war) was like Jesus, coming to defeat Satan in 7BC. The triple conjunction emphasises the nature of God as Trinity; repeated 3 times every 800 years. 'Triple' is built into our nature, with:

- 1,2,3 go
- body, mind and spirit.
- length, breadth and height.

The present calendar was made in AD500 by Dionysius, a monk. But he made mistakes: first with the birth of Jesus in AD1 instead of 0 and Augustus Caesar died in 4BC, which brings us to 5BC for the visit of the wise men. Herod killed all the babies of up to two years old, which was when Jesus was born in 7BC.

Aspects of Romantic Love

Climate and Nature Bill

The Climate and Nature Bill is a private members' Bill, originally introduced to Parliament by Caroline Lucas and reintroduced a number of times since. However, this time it was introduced by an MP who was drawn third in the private members' Bill ballot, and so it has a much better chance of making progress than it has had before.

The Bill is the only proposed legislation before the UK Parliament that ensures a comprehensive and joined-up approach to the climate emergency and nature crisis. In brief, the Bill seeks to ensure that the UK meets its international commitments on climate and nature by 2030 by:

- Making sure the UK cuts emissions fairly and fully, to stay within our share of the 1.5C carbon budget
- Making sure the UK not only halts, but also reverses, the destruction of nature by 2030
- Involving UK citizens in deciding the fairest way forward.

Caroline Nokes, the MP for Romsey & Southampton North, is now a deputy speaker, so is unable to vote on the Bill. But if you live in a different constituency, it is worth writing to your MP and asking them to support the Bill.

Green Tips for February

Valentines Day - Don't buy cards with glitter or plastic, chocolate with palm oil or flowers from a different country.

International Book Giving Day falls in February. If you plan to give someone a book, consider a second hand one. The Oxfam bookshop in Romsey is well worth a visit. *Claire Thompson*

Recycling the items below via St John's Church mini-recycling centre can generate funds for various charities:

- used postage stamps, ideally with a 1cm margin
- old spectacles, (not cases or contact lenses).
- used printer cartridges and new unopened printer cartridges (not laser or toner cartridges)

(We are no longer able to recycle used plastic pens & felt tips. And, for the time being, we cannot accept milk bottle tops. Please spread the word. However, Test Valley will now accept the tops in your kerbside recycling bin, if they are put back on the plastic bottle after it has been squashed.)

Thanks to everyone who helps us recycle. The ink cartridge recycling not only means that waste is kept out of landfill but it also raises money for our churches. The last batch sent off raised £19.50. So far we have raised about **£460** since we started collecting them.

January 2025's Litter Pick

Happy New Year to you all! Many thanks to everyone who came along to January's litter pick, in the freezing temperatures, to pick along Nursling Street. There were 12 of us including our photographer, Mary!



We fanned out from the Four Horseshoes pub. Close to the pub, there was the usual discarded glass bottles and broken glass but also a lot of food waste and cigarette butts. The carpark held surprises of a fly tipped metal framed bed head board and some metal that we couldn't identify, a fluffy rug and a half empty bag of compost.

Cigarette butts, my pet peeve, can take up to 10 years to completely degrade, the chemicals they release can remain in the environment for many more years beyond the life of the cigarette butt itself and are harmful to our water systems and marine life.

At the end of the hour, we had filled 5 bags of general waste, 3 bags of recyclables including, plastic bottles and aluminium cans.



National Nest Box Week: 14th - 21st February

Where can family-minded birds raise their young these days? As our gardens and parklands become smaller and tidier, too many natural nest sites – such as holes in trees, old buildings and unkempt hedgerows – are rapidly disappearing. No wonder that our sparrows, greenfinches and swifts are in precipitous decline, and that one in four of our UK bird species are now under serious threat. This makes it more important than ever to care for our remaining birds. By feeding, providing water and putting up nest boxes we can give them a safe space to raise their chicks.

The National Nest Box Week initiative encourages bird conservation across the UK, and it's easy to get involved, whether



you're a teacher, part of a local wildlife group, or just wanting to boost the bird numbers in your own garden. Visit: <u>https://www.nestboxweek.com/</u>

'Dear children, let us not love with words or speech, but with actions and in truth.' (1 John 3:18).

The writer Gary Chapman describes how love can be expressed in 5 different 'languages':

- words of encouragement,
- quality time,
- ♥ gifts,
- ♥ acts of service, and
- ♥ touch.

Do you have a preferred language of love? As we think about St Valentine during this month, let's consider how God's love language is expressed in the word agape.


This is exclusively found in the New Testament and is uniquely defined by Jesus: 'This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down His life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters.' (1 John 3:16).

Jesus' giving of His life on the cross provides the model for how we can demonstrate God's love in our relationships with others. It is self-giving: are we ready to put the other person first, as Jesus did when He died for us in our place. Are we generous with our time, words, money and service, whatever the cost?

It takes the initiative: are we ready to show love to those who don't deserve it or who we find hard to love? Do we have eyes of compassion to see their needs and a heart to love and serve them?

It is intentional: are we ready to get close to those in need around us, irrespective of the time we have or how we feel?

The story is told of Jesus asking a little child, 'how much do you love me?' The child replied 'lots and lots and lots!' Then they asked Jesus how much He loved them. Jesus stretched out His arms wide and said 'I love you this much', as they nailed Him to a cross.




