As the leaves turn and a new season of Spring approaches, when we are reminded of new beginnings, new opportunities and new growth, and all that it entails, we find ourselves on the cusp of a wonderful occasion in the life of our parish. St. John's

Church, which has been a beacon of faith and worship in our parish, reaches a significant milestone this year, as we celebrate its 170th anniversary on 25th October

This represents not just 170 years of bricks and mortar, but 170 years of faith, companionship, and community outreach. For generations our parish Churches have been vibrant hubs for our shared Christian journey. From Alpha courses and home groups, where we learn more of God's love, to baptisms and weddings that have celebrated the joys of life, to funerals and times of sorrow where we've found comfort and support. Our parish has witnessed countless moments of profound significance in the lives of numerous people.

Consecrated in 1855, St. John's Church has witnessed a myriad of changes both in the world and within its walls. And whilst the Church's exterior symbolizes tradition, the interior tells the story of innovation and adaptability, reflecting a congregation that values forward-thinking approaches to worship, even from the earliest days when the second vicar, RF Wilson, extended the North aspect of the building through the vestry.

This work goes on through the ongoing application to replace pews with chairs, aimed at enhancing our worship experience. This initiative is driven by a desire to foster a more welcoming and flexible environment for all who come into the Church. A change which symbolizes the Church's adaptation to modern worship styles whilst maintaining the essence of hospitality, worship and friendship.

In tandem with the pew-to-chair faculty application, our parish is embarking on a review of St John's Church Hall. This expansion is central, not only for facilitating Church activities, but also for accommodating community events – with possibly a new pre-school opportunity.

St Boniface Church Hall has itself emerged in a transformed state, as the Men's Shed continue to fashion the building, making it their long-term home. By developing these resources, our Churches aim to enhance their role as hubs for social interaction and ministry, reinforcing links with our community.



The significance of reaching out into our community cannot be overstated. Our Churches are deeply committed to embodying the message of love and service taught by Jesus, focusing on building relationships beyond our congregations. The Church continues to reach out in many ways, as we strive to become a 'City on a hill' a light in the darkness, as Matthew 5.14 reminds us. We will continue to actively seek to make a

positive impact in Rownhams and Nursling and the surrounding areas, embodying Jesus' new commandment of loving our neighbours (John 13.34-35).

This anniversary year itself presents a wonderful opportunity for the parish to reinforce and enhance these connections. Events planned throughout the year aim to bring the community together, offering a combination of worship, fun, and celebrations. From **family fun days** like our planned combined celebration of our Church's anniversary and the **King's birthday on 21st June**, to our **flower and garden show on 16th August** (now is the time to get growing as spring begins to emerge), to our Harvest shared lunch and our **anniversary service on 26th October**, our parish invites everyone - whether regular attendees or newcomers, or those who have not been near our Churches for years - to come along to these celebrations and embrace the spirit of togetherness, of community, of commonality. These gatherings celebrate the Church's history, but also pave the way for future and new connections, reminding us all of the importance of sharing Christ's love with our community as part of our combined journey of faith.

Perhaps as you read this, you can pray and reflect upon how you can get involved - I'm sure there is a role for you - or how you can support and encourage others. Importantly, who could you invite to come along to these great opportunities to journey with one another and embrace our community.

Our anniversary celebrations are not just a celebration of time passed; but a vibrant affirmation of the love that binds our congregations and the community we serve. Through thoughtful transformations such as the pew-to-chair transition and the planned Church Hall extensions, as well as its unwavering commitment to outreach, our parish exemplifies an active model of faith that resonates deeply with both its members and the broader community.

As we move forward, may we continually embody the teachings of Jesus, fostering love and fellowship among ourselves and reaching out to those around us, ensuring that our Churches together remain a welcoming home for all.

Mothering Sunday and Mother Church

The Fourth Sunday in Lent was called 'Mid-Lent' or 'Refreshment Sunday', when the rigors of Lent were relaxed more than was normal for a feast day. It is called Mothering Sunday as a reference to the Epistle reading for the Day (Galatians 4:21-31). The Lenten Epistles follow from each other with teaching about our life as Christians and how we are to follow Christ.

On Mid-Lent Sunday the Epistle talks of bondage and freedom; the bondage of the Law and the Old Covenant as compared to the freedom in Christ, "the promised one", and the New Covenant. Verse 26 reads "But Jerusalem which is above is free, which is the mother of us all." We gain our freedom from Christ and, as it was seen before the Reformation, the Church.

Thus, Mothering Sunday is about the freedom that we gain through the promise of Jesus Christ delivered through our Mother, the Church. People were encouraged to go to their 'Mother Church' (their home Church or their home Cathedral) to worship and give thanks. Hence apprentices, and others, went home for the weekend and often brought gifts (or accumulated pay) home to their family.

On the other hand, Mother's Day is a secular festival invented in 1904, celebrated on the 2nd Sunday in May in most countries in the world. The UK seems to be the exception. In recent years the holiday has changed and, in many ways, now resembles the American Mother's Day, with families going out to Sunday lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.

Highlights from the PCC Meeting (28th Jan 2025)

Safeguarding

- **Pews to Chairs** Our Faculty is now with the Diocesan Chancellor, awaiting his decision.
- Church Wardens Update Ann Laird and Peter Myerscough-Jackopson have now been authorised as Church Wardens for this Parish, by the Archdeacon. They will be based at St John's Church.
- **Church Hall** A Feasibility Study Group will meet to discuss the future of the Hall. Comments welcome from all to pccsecretary@twinspires.org.uk

Those of you who remember Audrey Newport from Bridgers Close will be sad to hear that she died on 23rd January, aged 97. Her funeral is scheduled for Monday 24th February at



11am in St John's Church. She has been living in Woodley Grange Care Home for a few years and was bright and chatty until about 2 months ago when she went into hospital with pneumonia and although she was later discharged, she wasn't the same. I know she was looking forward to Heaven.

I didn't start visiting Audrey until after she stopped being able to come to Church. She was a lovely lady and was always very glad to see visitors. I know it troubled her after she had moved to Woodley Grange Care Home that she couldn't offer visitors the hospitality she would have liked to.

She really appreciated receiving the monthly Caraway pack, produced by the Anna Chaplains in Southampton, especially for older people who were no longer able to get to Church. She would sometimes talk to me about the previous months' contents.

Audrey was a very keen bell ringer and, in her youth, pre-1950, rang bells at All Saints Church, Hampreston. She asked me recently if I could find out whether they still had a bell ringing team – they do. She loved watching snooker, and her favourite TV programme was Countryfile.

Audrey was always a friendly, welcoming person, who loved the company of her friends, and was always interested in what you were doing in your life, and within your family. She was a very good cook, so, when visiting Audrey at home, you would always be

welcomed with a cup of tea, homemade Victoria sandwich, biscuits or scones, or maybe mince pies at Christmas or Eccles cakes at Easter.

She was never judgemental and accepted you as you are. She had many friends, of all ages, and was loved and well thought of by those who knew her.

Audrey was a verger at St John's Church, and very much enjoyed helping at weddings. She was a bell ringer, who went on annual bellringing holidays. Additionally, she was treasurer for the Mothers' Union for many years, which is where I first met her, and we became good friends.

I have been friends with Audrey for 38 years and will miss visiting Audrey, and our chats, both at her house, and, latterly, at Woodley Grange; I will treasure my memories.



When Audrey could no longer get to Church, I went to her house with home Communion on a regular basis. She was always very welcoming; and after our little service she had tea and biscuits ready for a nice chat.

I did also manage to see her at Grange Care Home on one or two occasions; but she missed the more regular visits she had in her own house. I remember her mentioning snooker. *Rev Jim Stanley-Smith*

The Church Electoral Roll – Why Should You Be on it?

Notice is given that under the Church Representation Rules a **NEW** Church Electoral Roll for 2025 is being prepared.

Every person who wishes to have their name entered on the new Roll, whether it is entered on the present Roll or not, is requested to apply for enrolment.

It is only by being on the Roll that you can have your say in how your local Church is run – usually by attending the APCM (Wednesday 30th April this year in St John's Church at 7pm), but if we should ever have to call a Special General Meeting then you need to already be on the Roll to attend that too.

For ALL applicants, there will be printed application forms available at each Church, however, I would encourage you to email <u>electoralroll@twinspires.org.uk</u> so I can send you a form electronically.

You can now complete the form electronically. Please print your name in the signature box and return it to the address mentioned above using the same account that I used to send you the form.

Alternatively completed and signed printed application forms from the congregation at St Boniface Church can be placed in the box provided or given to Graeme Dixon. At St John's Church please give your completed form to me, a member of the Welcome Team, or put it in the box at the back of Church.

If you are not sure if you qualify then do read the notes on the form and, if you are still in doubt, please ask.

The renewal of the Roll begins on **1**st of March and completed forms need to be returned to me by **10**th April at the very latest, so please don't delay.

Nursling Men's Shed

Beside St Boniface Church in Church Lane the old Church Hall is the home of the Nursling Men's Shed. We are open from 9.30am on weekdays except Wednesday and on Thursday afternoon we have a Ladies' Shed.

We chat, drink tea or coffee and put the world to rights (which is getting harder) and at the same time repair or make things for ourselves and other local residents or get involved with one of the community projects that the Shed undertakes.

In the past, these community projects have included refurbishing a telephone box into housing a defibrillator, building planters for outside the Co-Op which are planted by the local school each year. and making cold frames, planters and seats for a local school.



At the same time, we are making new friends and learning new things, we have a fully functioning workshop. Many of our members are encouraged to visit the Shed by their families who can see there may be a benefit for Dad or Grandad in getting out and about.

We are always looking for new members, our Shed is safe and warm, with a kitchen and toilets. We are a registered charity and one of the 54 Men's Sheds in Hampshire and 600 in the UK.

So What Happened to the Climate and Nature Bill?

Last month I wrote about the private member's Climate and Nature (CAN) Bill that was due to have its second reading at the end of January.

To recap, this Bill was an attempt to make sure that the UK met its international commitments for climate and nature by 2030 by:

- Making sure the UK cuts emissions fairly and fully to stay within our share of the 1.5C carbon budget
- Making sure the UK not only halts, but also reverses, the destruction of nature by 2030
- Involving UK citizens in deciding the fairest way forward.

Many people wrote to their MPs asking them to support the Bill and a majority of MPs signed up to do so. This second reading should have been an opportunity for MPs to thoroughly debate 'the greatest, long-term, global challenge that we face' and for the Government to prove that it understands the urgent need to restore nature and work out how to reduce carbon emissions quickly.

It was good that these important issues were debated and there was a lot of cross-party support, but sadly proceedings were interrupted with an unexpected defence update from the Government, despite the fact that Fridays are supposed to be focussed on private members bills not Government business. This meant there was not enough time to debate fully and vote. The second reading will now be in July which means it will be more difficult for it to make further progress this parliamentary term.

Although this is very disappointing, there was some progress behind the scenes as the Minister for Nature assured MPs that their next steps would include 'binding commitments' to advance the Bill's objectives. Ed Miliband, from the Department for Energy Security & Net Zero, has also said that his Department is committed to 'set to work' on the Bill's objectives 'including for legislation'. *Claire Thompson*

We are no longer able to recycle used plastic pens and felt tips. And, for the time being, we cannot accept milk bottle tops. However Test Valley will now accept bottle tops in your kerbside recycling bin, if they are put back on the plastic bottle after it has been squashed.



Thanks to everyone who helps us recycle. The ink cartridge recycling not only means that waste is kept out of landfill, but it also raises money for our churches. The last batch sent off raised £19.50. So far, we have raised about **£460** since we started collecting them.

A Lent Reflection



Somebody asked a Christian friend why he was eating doughnuts, when he had given them up for Lent! He answered, 'At the bakers I told God, that if He wanted me to buy doughnuts, He should provide a parking space in front. On the eighth time around, there it was!'

Rather than seeing Lent simply as a time to give things up, let's use it intentionally for self-examination, reading Scripture, penitence, fasting and prayer.

At Jesus' baptism, God's voice says, 'You are My Son, whom I love; with You I am well pleased.' (Luke 3:22). The Holy Spirit then leads Jesus into the wilderness, where we find Him coming to terms with who He is. Satan's temptations challenge Jesus in three key areas of His identity:

- His divine sonship,
- political power and
- Messianic role (Luke 4: 1-13).

It is as though Jesus was looking into the mirror at Himself to discern what kind of Saviour He should be.

For us, Lent is an opportunity to hold up a mirror to ourselves and ask the question, *'who am I*? It's a season of honest encounter with who we are, what we've done, and how we should live. What will we see when we hold up the mirror to ourselves?

Keeping Lent, the 40 days running up to Easter, could mean taking time to read Scripture, studying a Christian book or spending five minutes each day in silence! We might fast by missing one or two meals, refraining from TV, alcohol, social media, or scrolling on our phones. All of these can help us to give more attention to God in our lives.

Whatever we do, Lent is a season for self-reflection, as we put ourselves in a position to receive afresh the forgiveness and healing that God offers.

Bearing Fruit Takes Time

The nine fruits of the Spirit are Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self-Control. We don't strive for the fruits of the Spirit, rather we plant ourselves in good soil, allow ourselves to be fed by the Holy Spirit, keep taking in nourishment, turn to face the light of Christ and these fruits will develop and grow in our lives.

Can you tell whether a tree is an apple tree or a pear tree? Not easily when they are in blossom, but very easily when they bear fruit. Bearing fruit takes time and a lot of planting, preparation, nurture and growth.

March is the time of year when gardeners begin to plant seeds ready for summer, but patience is needed – the seeds will take a while to germinate, and the gardener needs to write the names of seeds on labels and not forget which are fruit, flowers and vegetables. The seeds need to be in the dark, or the light, or the warmth or the cool, depending at what stage of life they are at.

So too, is God with us. God writes our names on His heart; God knows what fruit we can bring forth. God nurtures us and gives us light to grow. But first, we need to be planted and that can be scary.

Maybe you're feeling in a cold dark place this March, maybe it feels as if you've been buried, maybe you've got a weight above you and you can't see the way out. Just think that maybe you've been buried because you've been planted.

With patience there will be warmth and light, be like a seed, trust God, and begin to grow out of the darkness towards God's marvellous light. We won't see fruit immediately; we have to be nourished and mature and ripen. Patience will be given to us, fruit of the seed of the Holy Spirit. *Parish Pump*

The Gulf of Mexico? Or America?

As well as Greenland and the Panama Canal (and perhaps Canada), President Trump wants the Gulf of Mexico. On his very first afternoon in office, he ordered that the name be changed to the Gulf of America.

Apparently American Presidents can do these things; and the US Board on Geographic Names was given 30 days to change the Gulf's name on all official maps throughout the US. Some navigation apps, including Google Maps, were under pressure to change it immediately. Trump's reason for changing, he says, is that the ocean basin is "ours" and that the US does "most of the work there".

But President Trump cannot dictate what other countries call the gulf, as it is an international body of water, with coastlines in the US, Mexico and Cuba. Mexico and Cuba have no plans to follow Trump's lead. With that in mind, Britain has politely declined to change the name. In the UK, it will remain the Gulf of Mexico, unless and until Trump's new name for it gains "widespread usage" in English.

Pope Calls on Journalists to Look for Good News



The Pope has urged journalists to look out for 'good news' stories among so much doom and gloom in global media coverage. His call came during a gathering in Rome of media professionals from around the world that included an audience with Pope Francis.

The Pope said, "I encourage you to discover and make known the many stories of goodness hidden in the folds of the news, imitating those gold-prospectors who tirelessly sift the sand in search of a tiny nugget."

His words come as increasing numbers of people are turning away from news coverage, describing it as "depressing, relentless and boring" according to a recent global survey. Almost four in 10 people worldwide said they sometimes or often avoid the news, up from just under three in 10 in 2017, according to the report by Oxford University's Reuters Institute.

To counter this, the Pope urged journalists and other media professionals to be 'communicators of hope' in a world where divisive disinformation abounds.

Pope Francis, who heads the world's estimated 1.4 billion Catholics called on all those involved in communications "to focus on beauty and hope even in the midst of apparently desperate situations" and to work to generate "commitment, empathy and concern for others."

He said: "Too often today, communication generates not hope, but fear and despair, prejudice and resentment, fanaticism and even hatred." The message also, perhaps, had criticism for the power and influence being wielded by Big Tech companies, such as Elon Musk's 'X', and Meta – that recently announced it was removing fact-checkers from its US operation.

He said, 'In these our times, characterised by disinformation and polarisation, as a few centres of power control an unprecedented mass of data and information, I would like to speak to you as one who is well aware of the importance - now more than ever - of your work as journalists and communicators.'

He called on journalists to communicate hope, noting that 'The hope of Christians has a face, the face of the risen Lord.' His gift of the Holy Spirit 'enables us to hope even against all hope, and to perceive the hidden goodness quietly present even when all else seems lost.' **Parish Pump**


